Words From My Mother

After the past three years as Spiritual Grown on the District Board I am going off the Board. So, this is my last article. I have enjoyed finding devotions by looking through my mother's papers and devotionals as well as other books of my own and the internet. Mom wrote many of the devotions herself but also found pieces from magazines, such as IDEAL and SUNSHINE, little pamphlets and even seasonal cards. Some of the cards were from one of my brothers. So once again, I went to my mom's papers/cards and found two different accounts of the Legend of the Holly and then a poem that incorporated these two. They are as follows:

The Shepherd Boy and the Wreath

A poor shepherd boy had no gift to give the Holy Child, so he made a tiny crown of leaves from a holly bush. Compared to the expensive gifts that others had given, the crown seemed of very little value. So the shepherd boy began to cry as he presented it. But when the Babe touched the holly crown with His tiny hand, the leaves suddenly gleamed and the teardrops turned to scarlet berries. So through the centuries, the holly wreath became a traditional Christmas decoration, reminding us of the miracle of Christ's birth.

There are many legends about this evergreen bush with its shiny leaves and bright berries. Holly has been used as a decoration representing good will and rejoicing throughout the ages.

One legend associates holly with the burning bush Moses encountered in the wilderness. Another tells us that Christ's crown of thorns was woven from holly, and before the crucifixion the plant bore white berries, which later turned to crimson.

Because it stays green all winter, holly is considered a symbol of immortality and is associated with the promise of everlasting life.

The red holly berry which we now know Was once just as white as the new-fallen snow And bloomed on its tree by the old stable there Where the Christ Child was cradled, so soft and so fair ... And the villagers came from miles around To offer their gifts as they knelt to the ground Except for one child who had only a limb Of white holly berries that he carried with him So he offered it humbly to the Infant new-born Who pricked His small finger upon a sharp thorn Ane His blood remained there upon one shiny leaf -The holly branch bowed while its heart filled with grief

For it saw in a vision in years soon to be A crown made of thorns from a small holly tree And so in its sorrow, its grief and its shame The white holly berries blushed redder that flame Bur Mary, the Mother, said, "Do not be sad You are the innocent, 'Rejoice and be Glad. For as you weep in pity at what men will do God sends forgiveness and blessings to you." And in that short moment, the red berries shone And so, that's how holly has come to be known As the symbol of Christmas and Christ's holy birth And the symbol of cheer to all men on earth.
